

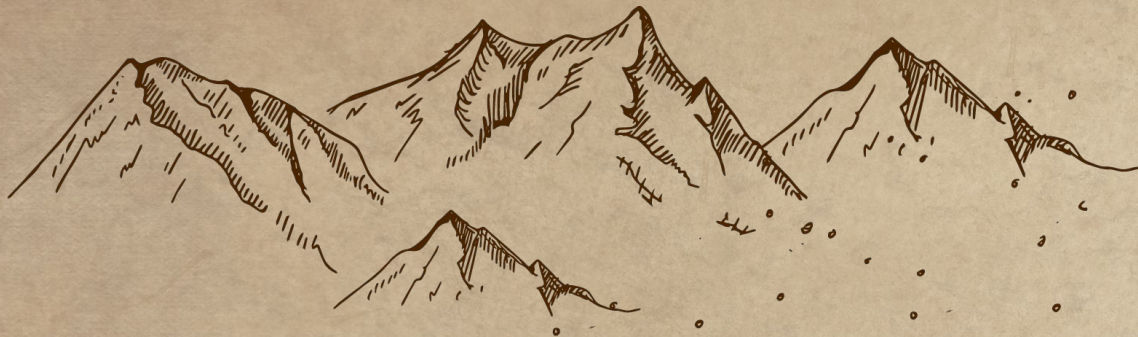

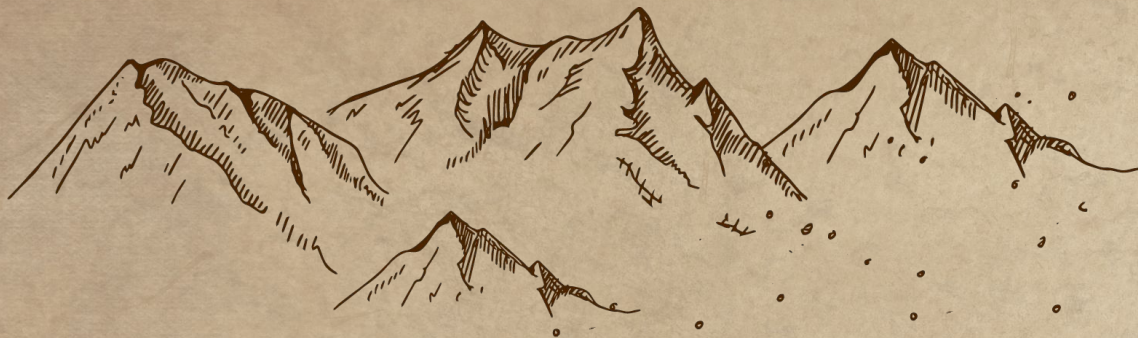

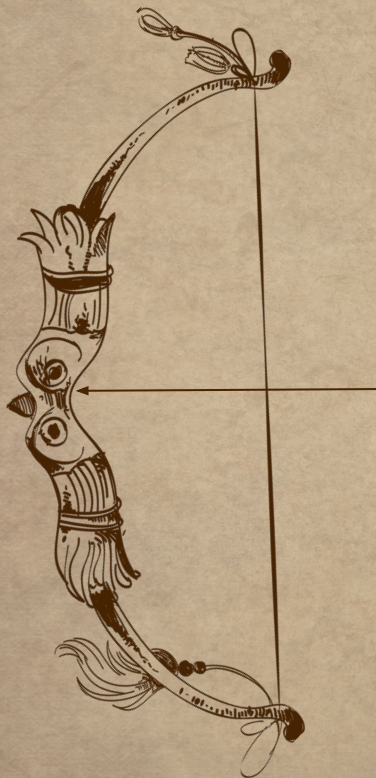

# Artist

August 22, 1898 – November 11, 1976) was an American sculptor, painter, and draughtsman. He is especially known for being the creator of mobiles, a type of kinetic sculptures that move thanks to the action of a motor or the action of air currents. In contrast, Calder's static sculptures are known as stables.

# Technique

He studied in 1923 at the Art Students League of Los Angeles, and in 1925 he made illustrations for the National Police Gazette, moving to Paris in 1926, where he began to cultivate his wire technique. It didn't take long for his sculptures to achieve fame in France and in his country of origin.

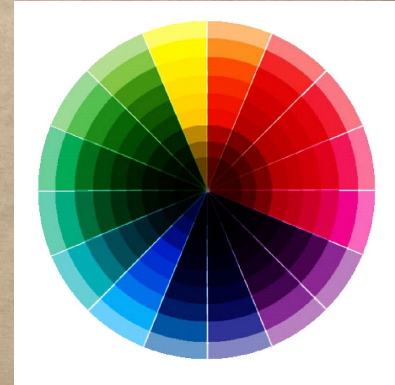

Alexander Calder was an American engineer and sculptor who moved to the vibrant Paris of the 1920s and began creating animal figures in wood and wire. Little by little he simplified them until he reached abstraction and discovered that they gained dynamism if they actually moved.

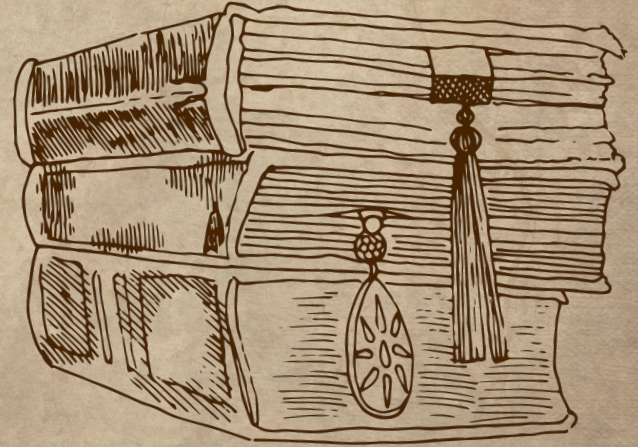
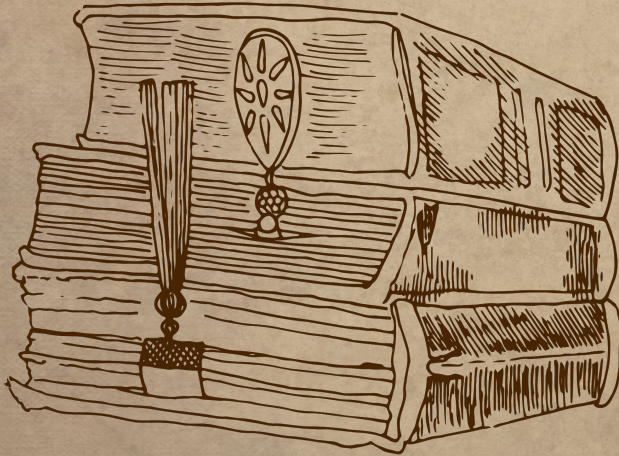

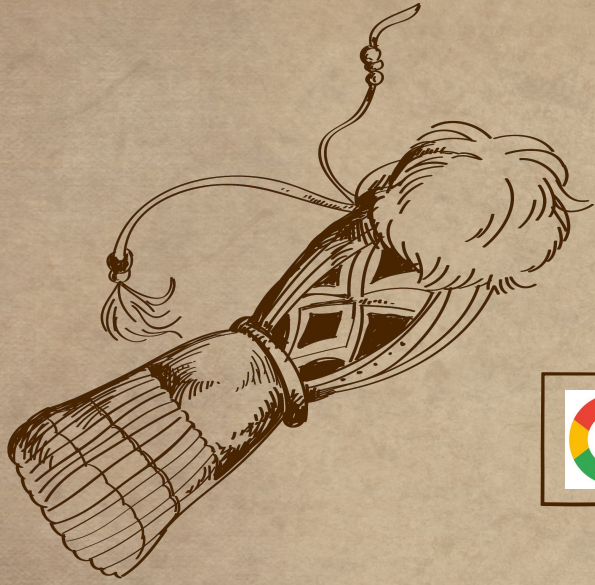
